It was pretty sweet seeing our first newspapers in last month's issue, was it not? The word was as well received back then as it is today. Let us hope it continues another fifty-three years.



Mentor

Hello, Brethren. In the past this Mentor column has discussed Freemasonry in Cuba and Puerto Rico during the XIX Century (e.g., May 2021). We will now quickly overview the XX Century.

During the first forty years after Cuba became independent (in 1902), Freemasonry developed firmly throughout the island. Most every town had its own one-story Lodge building and the big cities had more than one. Havana, whose metropolitan area had 25% of the country's popu-

lation, included about one-third of all Cuban Lodges, plus the Appended Bodies and the Grand Lodge. Many social, political and economic public figures, such as government ministers, university deans, newspaper editors, business executives, etc., joined Masonry and several became Grand Masters. It was its golden age.

Such leading town figures as doctors, judges, pharmacists, schoolteachers, chiefs of police, mayors, political bosses—even the priest—usually became members. Many local and national issues were informally considered. My father joined one of these Lodges, Verdad, in a provincial city, in 1926.

After 1940 the economic situation of the country improved and Freemasonry spread much faster, doubling in members and Lodges. The new Lodge buildings had now two stories: the first floor was rented out for income and the Lodge used the second floor. A Grand Lodge skyscraper was built in Havana using three floors for Lodges and the Masonic university and renting the rest. More social, political and economic public figures joined, enhancing Masonry's public standing.

But the government's political corruption and mismanagement was creating an unhealthy environment. Freemasonry and other civil society groups failed to help improve this situation. It led to a broad loss of faith in the Cuban governmental system. Such loss in turn brought the 1959 revolution, as many thought a new generation would help fix our national problems (at the time, Marxism was not part of said fix). However, the remedy proved an even worse result than the disease.

The revolutionary government took over all private enterprise, education system, and media and banned all political parties. Citizens were required to fill long forms known as "cuentame tu vida" (tell me the story of your life) where religious and fraternal activities, past work history,



Recently my family has gone through some suffering because of dementia. A lot of what has happened has made me think more in depth of what Masonry has done for me and others. More on this later.

To be a Mason you must meet certain requirements. You must be a man, freeborn and at least 18 years old, with a belief in a supreme non-denominational deity. (The "freeborn" part is just a holdover now but is still there to preserve the heritage of the Fraternity). These are the basics but there are more.

One is that you are joining of your own free will, not simply following a friend or family member out of an obligation. Another is that

you are not an old man in dotage. Being old does not prevent one from joining but it is required that one be mentally healthy and alert, "Not suffering in dotage."

The ritual that we memorize (most of you way better than me) is an exercise for sure. But I cannot help but think how good that is. There are Masons much older than me who can recite Degree ritual verbatim with little to no effort. These mental exercises I believe can only be a good thing.

Here is the "More on this later" part. I feel that if someone like my father or my mother had continued exercising their brain after retirement that dementia would not have progressed so quickly. Masonry is not the only option but look around you at the brethren in your Lodge. They are there because they are making that effort.

I was told to learn a second language, play an instrument. I was also told that continuing to learn and being in social groups are some of the greatest things we can do for ourselves to maintain a healthy and alert mental state.

I have been a Mason for ten years now (short term, by some standards) and I have met many Masons much older than me. I am always impressed at how alert and alive they are. This is true not just in my own Lodge but also in the others I have visited. I once again cannot help but think that they are in such good shape mentally because they work to be proficient in ritual, attend meetings and events regularly. And they invest the same effort in the rest of their life outside of Masonry. I look fondly upon this Fraternity of ours and the men involved whom I call Brothers.

On March 14 we had our annual Tri-Lodge meeting with Memorial and Tully lodges. We started out with a meal of some slow-smoked

Editor's Prerogative

Over the Counter and Through the Woods

In this April composition of entries there is an interesting convergence of voices, not exactly singing the same tune but presenting a harmony of sentiments. See what I mean when you look at the column of the District Deputy for Cayuga-Tompkins; the Master of Scipio Lodge in the same District; the Staff Officers of Cortland-Madison and Oswego; and the Worshipful Master of Nortrip Lodge in Onondaga. I call out the quote about success: "...making yourself consistently do the things you don't want to do." And the image of growth as a pruning and an expanding. We are urged as Masons and citizens not only to share the Light but also to be the Light. John Pierce, in nice phraseology, talks of a spring cleaning of the soul, the need to "cleanse our inner chambers...sweep away negativity and plant seeds of goodwill."

These thoughts are powerful images and good motivators—if we let them be. Todd Burns shares a poignant personal story in his Nortrip column, and then uses it to push us all toward the healthy benefits of ongoing learning and social engagement and friendships, which are the stuff of Masonry.

These are good pieces of advice, which we have heard in many forms many times before. We can embrace them and apply them without having to validate them. By contrast, I am reading a little Kindle book about a treatment for mitochondrial defects. I have never heard of this product, nor the author. I am not sure where to go to fact-check. He may be just another guy with a product to sell and a YouTube to promote. But part of his thesis is a debunking of long-standing medical—and Big Pharm—theory and treatments. For one of many examples, he spurns the knee-jerk prescription of nitric oxide as a vasodilator (think Viagra) and suggests instead that its overuse complicates and worsens the condition it tries to fix. The medical industry is fixated on disease and throwing at each one an expensive treatment. He cites as one example a gene-therapy treatment that costs more than \$2 million for a single dose.

Rather than spending billions for R&D on disease cures that do not cure, the industry, he says, should focus on what is happening at the cellular level. Many, many studies have been done over decades showing outcomes counter to the medical machine's truths in any number of treatments of "disease." These findings are downplayed or suppressed, for obvious financial reasons. If this sounds like a conspiracy theory, I guess I will have to say, Guilty. But once again, if it is true it is not theory. We saw it all through the COVID thing. And consider the hundreds of products that are hyped whenever we turn on the TV. Consider, too, the happy consumers in those ads frolicking with grandchildren, oblivious to the thirtyseven pages of possible side effects.

The product, subject of the book, is available as a pharmaceutical supplement. The author cites several instances where it has proven useful and effective, for many years, against such things as malaria, Ebola, migraines and arthritis. He discusses autism, stress and depression, and PTSD and bipolar issues. And he devotes a lot of space to the dementia manifestations of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's. This thing looks to me to be a miracle for your healthcare toolbox but this is not an endorsement by me. I intend to do much more homework and see if I can satisfy myself that it—and he—are

at this event but is also a testament to the dedication and unity that exist amongst the Brothers within the District.

Though we wish we could, due to the size of the class we cannot accommodate candidates from other Districts for the obligation or Raising portions of the Degree. That said, we welcome any candidates from other Districts to join us for the Hiramic Legend, Charges, etc. This means that you will need to ensure these Brothers are obligated and Raised prior to their participation in our Third Degree. Prior arrangements will need to be made to accommodate these Brothers before April 14. Please send me an email ddgm@onondaga district.com if you have candidates you would like to get involved.

The event has a total capacity of 250 Brothers. Though that might seem like a lot, about 35% of that is already filled by the candidates and Degree participants, so getting reservations and payment in early is imperative. We will be accepting reservations on two timelines, one for Onondaga District members and another which we will open up to the rest of the surrounding Districts and state.

The cost of attendance will be \$30 per person. This amount is the same for spectators, Degree participants and candidates. If you will be on the mountain, this is the cost, no exceptions. This fee covers operating the event and includes a quickservice lunch on the top of the mountain. Transportation is being coordinated for getting to the top of the mountain and limited space will be reserved for 4-wheel drive vehicles at the peak, through prior arrangements.

The Degree will be an allday affair. The gavel will drop at 9 a.m. on June 8 (remember that the rain date is June 15). Please arrange to be there well in advance in ordered to be seated in time for the opening. More details will follow on the seating. Two options are being considered and one includes a bring-your-own lawn chair. Dress for the event will be long pants (jeans are fine) and a button-down or polo. Wear shoes appropriate for walking and being in an outdoor environment.

There will be a dinner buffet at the conclusion of the Degree at the base of the mountain. This is a separate cost of \$40 per person and it is open to all Masons and families, regardless of participation in the Degree at the top of the mountain. A separate reservation will be required.

Reservations may be placed by navigating to http:/ degree.onondagadistrict .com. Here you will fill out a form with your information and be pushed to a site to accept payment. When your reservation is accepted you will receive an email from degree@onondagadistrict .com confirming your spot.

Reservations will be open on the following timelines: Onondaga District-only reservations will be accepted from March 15 to April 27. On April 28 reservations will open to all Masons in the state regardless of which District they are from. Once we reached 250 reservations, the reservation portal will close. Note that even if you are participating in the Degree you will still need to make a reservation.

Tully Lodge has offered to host a luncheon or event for the Ladies on the day of the Degree. We are looking to see how much interest there is for this. If your Lady would be interested in participating, please so indicate on the reservation form.

The performance of this Degree is something we have been planning for and working on for well over a year now. We are extremely excited to be able to present this to the brethren of our area. Many of us cannot remember the last time our entire District got together and worked together to Raise a class of Master Masons, let alone in a picturesque environment on the top of a mountain overlooking Otisco Lake. The amount of effort, time and dedication the District Team and the Degree participants are putting into this all but guarantees that this will be one for the ages. We are excited to have you be a part of it and look forward to seeing many of you on the mountain.



tion. Those classified as "non-supporters" were ignored.

Freemasonry was never banned, as occurred in Russia, Germany or Spain, for our Craft had a long and distinguished history forging the Cuban nation; but it was severely affected. Masonic Lodges were required to submit to the Ministry of Inte-

rior, within 72 hours after each session, a report detailing who was present, what matters were discussed, etc. Hence, between the tens of thousands who left the country and those who ended or decreased their Lodge attendance due to political mea-

Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday, made obligatory on each Rose Croix Chapter of the Scottish Rite, is a festival almost as old as the world, for it has been observed in some form or other from time immemorial. It began with early man's naive wonder at the coming of spring, an event to him of the very greatest importance, since it represented the return of the sun god from the death of winter to the resurrection of the vernal equinox. "The year's at the Spring," that was his feeling, and this feeling took a thousand forms of expression, some of them magical, some religious, some of them a joyous human merry-making. Whatever the form the kernel of feeling remained the same; the god of light, warmth, and life, whatever may have been his name Mithra, Attis, Cama, Osiris, Ormuzd, Dionysus had been dead through the winter time, and now he had come back to life again, and would bestow life on his people, therefore there were solemn rejoicings.

The Parsees, who retain ancient Zoroastrianism in something like its original form, still celebrate the event in a very old manner. They call their festival "Jamshedji Nauroz." Other religions have departed farther from the ancient forms but nevertheless retain the idea and the feeling. The Jews gave to their vernal festival the character of a national memorial service to keep fresh in the minds of the people their deliverance from bondage in Egypt, the land of darkness, and called it the Passover.

The Christian ceremony of the Lord's Supper has an historical connection with the Jewish Passover. Jesus and His disciples went to an upper room to observe the Passover (or Paschal) feast. Under normal circumstances there should have been a servant at hand to wash their feet, a service made necessary by the fact that all men wore sandals when walking abroad and consequently gathered up sand and dust; but there was no such servant available, and the disciples, who had gone on ahead, were quarreling among themselves as to who would perform this menial act. When Jesus arrived He immediately gave them all a silent rebuke by taking up a towel and basin to wash their feet Himself. But it will be better to give the story as found in the New Testament, John XIII. 1-15:

"Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus

"And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him;

"Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God;

"He riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself.

"After that he poureth water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded,

"Then cometh he to Simon Peter: and Peter saith unto him, Lord, dost thou wash my feet?

"Jesus answered and said unto him, What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter.

"Peter saith unto him, Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him, If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me.

"Simon Peter saith unto him, Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head.

"Jesus saith to him, He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit: and ye are clean, but not all.

"For he knew who should betray him; therefore said he, Ye are not all clean.

"So after he had washed their feet, and had taken his garments, and was set down again, he said unto them, Know ye what I have done to

"Ye call me Master and Lord: and ye say well; for so

"If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another's feet.

"For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you."

What the Passover had been among Jews the Last Supper came to be among Christians, and then with a very close connection with Easter Day. And since it was always the policy of the early Church to accommodate itself as closely as possible to the religious customs already in popular use both Easter and the celebration of the Lord's Supper became substituted for the ancient religious ceremonies of the vernal equinox, as that in its very act "of making all things new" the new religion retained many things very old,

and thus enabled the religious man to retain his contact with customs as ancient as the world.

The act of washing the disciples' feet, originally a simple rebuke to men untaught in the wisdom of humility, became in time a rich symbol of all service. Bishops and popes bathed the feet of the poor and everybody that was able distributed baskets of food to the needy. Some historians of the Church believe that the word "Maundy" came thus into use, being derived from the Saxon "maund" or "mond," meaning "basket"; others, with a sounder reasoning perhaps, trace the term to a corruption of the first Latin word in the saying "A new commandment give I unto you," which in the Vulgate read, Mandatum novum do vocio. In either event the Maundy Thursday rites have been quite generally practiced throughout Christendom, and still, in many lands, retain a very old form. One of the best examples is furnished by English customs, a very complete description of which may be found in Curious Survivals, by Dr. George C. Williamson (Herbert Jenkins, publisher), a page or two of which is here quoted with the publisher's permission:

"Perhaps the most interesting of the ancient ceremonies retained in the Church of England is that in connection with the distribution of Maundy money, which takes place annually in the Abbey. The last Sovereign in England who actually washed the feet of poor men on Maundy Thursday was James II. but this ceremony. in commemoration of the act of Our Lord, is still carried out in Catholic countries, and was, until recently, one of the notable events of Holy Week in Vienna, when the Emperor of Austria took the chief part in it. It still takes place in Spain with its accustomed ceremonial, but in England the day is commemorated only by the distribution of the silver currency, struck specially for that occasion, and given away to a certain number of poor men and poor women. who have been selected as suitable recipients for the bounty.

"English sovereigns have always attached great importance to this ceremonial. Elizabeth observed the day with specially lavish bounty, and there is a remarkable miniature in existence, representing her distribution of Maundy money. Charles I

and Anne also distributed the Maundy money with specially imposing and stately ceremonial, and today, linen scarves or towels are worn by all officials connected with the Royal Almonry, and by the children of the Royal Almonry, who also take part in the ceremonial. These are, of course, typical of the towel which Our Lord girded about Himself, when He washed the disciples' feet.

'The ceremonial is one of the few occasions when the public see the Yeomen of the Guard in their full uniform, the oldest military body in the kingdom, whose record dates back to 1485, and who still wear, with proud distinction, the Tudor crown ornament which commemorates their original appointment. Moreover, those who are to take part in the ceremony carry with them bunches of flowers and foliage, reminiscent of the day when the Yeomen of the Laundry performed a preliminary ablution of the feet of the beggars with ceremonial herbs, prior to the washing of the feet by the Sover-

"The money is borne into the Abbey by one of the Yeomen, who carries on his head a splendid silver-gilt dish, and the strings of the purses, red and white, with which originally they were bound to the girdle of the persons who used them, hang over the borders of the dish, with curious effect. The number of pennies given away corresponds with the age of the King, the recipients, as well as the pence in the white purses, equalling years of the King's age. The money consists of pieces of the value of fourpence, threepence, twopence and a penny, the total number of pence agreeing with the number of the years of the King's age, and the coins are current coin of the realm, although specially struck for the purpose. I am inclined to think that there might be some difficulty if one of these pennies was presented as the fare in an ordinary omnibus, because of its exceedingly small size, and the chances are that the 'bus conductor would not recognize it as current coin, but it is really so, and but for its size, the coin would pass readily from hand to hand.

"As a matter of fact, however, the little group of silver coins has a higher value than its intrinsic importance, and collectors are always eager to add it to their collections. The red purse should contain within it a pound, in gold, and thirty shillings, an allowance in lieu of provisions formerly given in kind; it does not in these later days contain gold coins, but the distribution is made in paper. In addition to this Maundy money, there are three other sums of money distributed on the same day, known as the Minor Bounty, the Discretionary Bounty and the Royal Gate Alms, and these, in accordance with ancient usage, are distributed at the Royal Almonry Office, to some 'hundred aged, disabled and meritorious persons, who have been personally recommended by the clergy of selected parishes,' throughout the different dioceses of England and Wales.

"Gate Alms no doubt derived its name from the money that was given to those beggars who clustered round the gates of the Royal Palaces, and the duties of the King's Almoner, with regard to poor people, are expressly laid down in some papers belonging to the time of Edward I, where it is stated that he was to collect and distribute the fragments from the Royal table, and give away the King's cast-off robes, but it is particularly noted that he was not to do so either to 'players, minstrels or flatter-

"Cardinal Wolsey, when first he kept his Maundy celebration, or, in the old phrase, 'made his Maund' (the word coming, of course, from the word mandatum, and being carried out in obedience to Our Lord's commands) did so at Peterborough; and on the occasion in 1530, gave three white and three red herrings to each recipient of his alms. It is to his benefaction that the Almonry owes its present seal. On this seal is represented a great threemasted ship, Henri Grace de Dieu, in full sail. This important vessel was built by Wolsey in 1512 and presented by him to Henry VIII, and when he was the King's Almoner he had it represented on the seal he used for the documents in connection with the ceremony, and this seal still exists, and is in use, at the present day.

"The great monasteries also had their almoners, and also some of the chief noblemen, and the office still survives and is used in various ancient hospitals, and in some few other places.

"It is of interest to notice that the Lord High Almoner and his assistant, the Subalmoner, remove the ceremonial capes which they wear when they enter in the procession of the Maundy, and gird themselves with linen towels before they make the presentation. The ceremony

must have been far more imposing in the old days, when the Sovereign himself took prominent part in it, but it is still an exceedingly interesting and picturesque one, and one of the most important survivals of an ancient religious observance. In Monte Cassino, in Italy, it is carried out with great elaboration, and the recipients are still actual pilgrims, but in addition to the washing of feet, they are the recipients of a big loaf of bread, and a piece of money, and are then taken in to the large refectory, and given a substantial meal. Similar procedure takes place in many other Catholic monasteries throughout Europe." (Page 179 ff.)

It is worthy of notice in this connection that Maundy Thursday, with its ceremony of the Lord's Supper, the Coena Domini, has been the inspiration of some of the most enduring art of the past thousand years. It appears in Da Vinci's picture, "The Last Supper"; in the epics of Calderon; in Wagner's "Parsifal"; and it has been the source of all the beautiful "grail (or graal) literature" ("grail" referring to the cup used by Jesus), of which Tennyson's Epics of the King is the most familiar example. The finest use of it in American literature is Lowell's Vision of Sir Launfal, in which are lines of almost poignant beauty:

"The Holy Supper is kept, indeed,

In whatso we share with another's need;

Not what we give, but what we share,

For the gift without the giver is bare;

Who gives himself with his alms feeds three,

Himself, hungering neighbour, and Me."

It would be difficult at this late day to trace the use of Maundy Thursday in Rose Croix Chapters of the Scottish Rite to any one origin. As there used, it is not Christian, Jewish or Pagan, but a re-writing of inspirations from many sources so as to make the ceremony stand in a universal tradition

"To Freemasons," writes Conley, "it has no religious significance, but it is a feast dedicated to freedom, and the right to worship God according to the dictates of our own consciences, in which good men of all creeds and faiths may join without relinquishing the essential doctrines of their own religion. It is this liberality that gives Masonry the character of universality."

sures penalizing participation, the participation of younger and economically active members substantially decreased. These measures were effective enough to choke Lodges. It was during this time that I joined the Craft, after two years of military service in the *labor units*. My Lodge was Island.

This situation lasted until

mid-1980s, when the Cuban government allowed religious believers and Masons to join official institutions. Pressures on membership and attendance eased up. It is possible that our past Cuban experience predisposes me to advocate on behalf of a more activist stance on the part of our Craft here that might contribute toward
