Hello, Brethren. As I write this I am still ruminating about the unacceptable events that took place in Washington DC, two days ago, when mobs invaded and vandalized the Capitol building. As a citizen, I cannot accept or justify such acts. As a Mason, my obligation of Love of Country compels me to take action. This article tries to analyze the issue from a Masonic point of view.

This is not a political issue. Whether we support or abominate President Trump or we feel indifferent about him, we should be disturbed with the images of the Capitol we saw in our TV screens. Citizens have the right to peacefully protest, whatever their reasons are (be they about Black Lives Matter or the presidential election results), and whether we agree with them or not. This falls under our obligation to be Tolerant of others, especially of those who disagree with us.

But events have exposed that inside these protests there

action signals their weakness and ineffectiveness.

A strong Civil Society response is far more than cosmetic. It sends a message to both our political leaders and to individuals participating in protests. The former care about re-election and will take into consideration voter's opinion. Good faith demonstrators will be more careful to join and organizers will become aware of public rejection, which goes against their intent.

Freemasonry constitutes a special case. We are not just another irrelevant club. We are an institution that prides itself in core principles such as Love of Country, Tolerance and Brotherly Love. Our principles, in addition to being obligations, constitute a formal part of our laws and regulations. This latter and particular condition differentiates the Craft from other groups and has both a positive and a negative side. The first side attracts good members: we want to belong to something noble. The second side is that if our proclaimed institutional values are seen by the outsiders as empty statements they will portray Freemasonry in a very poor light. And that is not good for recruiting or retaining new members, or for self-image. We need to do something. I propose developing a series of simple Zoom presentations about a theme at the core of the U.S. founding: the Federalist Papers (https://guides.loc.gov/federalist-pa-<u>pers/full-text</u>). They discuss the main concepts of the American Constitution, the document that governs everything. But how much do we actually know about these papers? How many were they? When were they written? Why? By whom? We could prepare a cycle of Zoom talks and open them to the public at large. This would provide the Craft good community exposure. If interested, send me an email. For now, may the GAOTU keep us safe until we become vaccinated and can again meet in our Lodges.

are at least two types of participants. Probably, most are true believers in the justice of their protest. And these tend to be peaceful and lawful individuals. But a few others infiltrate these movements to advance their own interests—be they personal or political—to steal, vandalize or create problems. Brotherly Love obligation does not cover those individuals. And it is precisely because of that that we are compelled to act.

The Social Fabric is formed both by individuals and by their organizations. The combination is called Civil Society. Social Fabric provides unwritten laws that regulate the behavior of its members. We do not steal or kill because we will be put in jail. We do not use foul language or take off our clothes in public because it is socially unacceptable: we could be censured and ostracized.

The leaders of Civil Society could have made declarations or taken ads in major newspapers condemning, in no uncertain terms, the entry and desecration of the Capitol building. The failure to publicly react to this unacceptable

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Editor's Prerogative

We have met the enemy

"Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."—Spanish philosopher George Santayana.

"Those that fail to learn from the past are doomed to repeat it."-British statesman Winston Churchill.

So here we are in a new year that feels an awful lot like the old one, just that we are getting an earlier start at the discomfort. In 2020 we waded into March before things crashed; on January 1, 2021 we plunged right back in, still up to our neck.

It is not about virus. This distress we feel is really of our own making, or rather, of those we answer to. Separation across our country feels engineered like the shutdown. You will observe that social distancing is not measured in linear feet. How do we correct that? bridge that gap? First, I suggest we ignore the drama and the clowns headlining the news and go from there.

Some time ago we were privileged to read an essay dealing with village life in England six hundred years ago. The author had gleaned facts relative to the people of this particular village whose history he was investigating, from the parish records. His labor throughout revealed the marks of patient industry and exhaustive research.

It requires no little imagination to realize that the ancestry of a people who have acquired a marked degree of culture, refinement, and progressive enterprise, could have possibly lived in such mean circumstances as he discovered. Of the people referred to there were no doubt some whose homes were near those of the lineal ancestry of George Washington, and a stretch of the imagination would make it possible to conclude that probably some of these shared the impoverished condition described as the lot of the common people. For example, we find that of Washington's ancestors, one was the first lay proprietor of the Manor of Sulgrave, suggesting a possible onetime emerging from a lower into a higher rank where respectable merchandising or some such vocation received more than paltry recognition.

Dr. Jessopp, our investigator, describing the conditions of that period, writes thus as the result of his findings:

"As for the houses themselves, they were squalid enough for the most part. The manor house was often built of stone, when stone was to be had, then of flint, as in so many of our church towers. The poorer houses were dirty hovels, run up 'anyhow,' sometimes covered with turf, sometimes with thatch. None of them had chimneys. Six hundred years ago houses with chimneys were at least as rare as houses heated by hot-water pipes are now. Moreover, there were no brick houses. It is a curious fact that the art of making bricks seems to have been lost in England for some hundreds of years. The laborer's dwelling had no windows; the hole in the roof which let out the smoke rendered windows unnecessary, and even in the houses of the well-to-do, glass windows were rare. In many cases oiled linen cloth served to admit a feeble semblance

of light, and to keep out the rain. The laborer's fire was in the middle of his house; he and his wife and children huddled round it, sometimes grovelling in the ashes, and going to bed meant flinging themselves down upon the straw which served them as mattress and feather bed, exactly as it does to the present day in the gypsy's tent in our byways. The laborer's only light by night was the smouldering fire. Why should he burn a rushlight when there was nothing to look at, and reading was an accomplishment which few laboring men were masters of?

Compare now, if you please, the following, which will give an interesting light on some of the perplexing problems that the civilized world is confronting after the Great War. From the comparison it will be readily seen that of the millions inhabiting the Balkan Peninsula, the great majority are almost on a par with those English rurals of six hundred years ago. A recent study of "The Balkans" by Professor Sloan discover for us an analogous condition depicted in the piece of historical research by Dr. Jessopp. In Professor Sloan's work which so remarkably sets forth the conditions under which men live in southeastern Europe today, we read particularly of a Montenegrin home. A visitor to Montenegro has a sense of that country's bitter poverty which the people themselves do not feel. As was said of Greece, the estimate of the tourist depends on his point of view.

"Amid the wild surrounding people, Montenegro is in a state of advanced civilization, a model and a stimulus. But a Montenegrin country home! Four stone walls and a roof, thatch or slate, with no chimneys, the smoke oozing out through every cranny of the eaves, the unglazed windows and open doors. Within is a clay floor, with smouldering embers in the middle, and wide couches round about; the cattle are in a lean-to at the end, with their hoard of manure cherished like the treasure it is. Some houses are better. some worse than this faithful description, but the average is very low. Squalid enough ancestry is here depicted, for so many of our twentieth century people have attained a degree of comfort and prosperity that is indeed enviable.

We are naturally always interested in finding the factors responsible for the generic movements, or the person responsible for what today must be regarded as wonderful transformation. For during these days of much talking about interdependence, organization and cooperation, little or no credit is ascribed to the effort of the individual, and the tendency is to a general forgetfulness of his potency. The chief concern seems to be to insist that all men are but relative in their usefulness, and in that last summing up are but cogs in a vast machine. Because of this it will do us good occasionally if we but revert to those wise sages who grace the pages of history, who have emphasized in unforgettable ways the value of the individual.

Let us turn to Carlyle, and we may read something like this relative to those who are sponsors for great movements in human progress:

"In all epochs of the world's history, we shall find the Great Man to have been the indispensable savior of his epoch; the lightning, without which the fuel never would have burnt. The History of the World, I said already, is the Biography of Great Men.'

A re-reading of the Heroes impressed the following quotation which seemed to us eminently worth considering. It is what Carlyle offers in regard to those puny souls who are forever delighting in disparaging their kind, and belittling the noble efforts of great men. "No sadder proof," says he, "can be given by a man of his own littleness than disbelief in great men.'

Our search then, for the factor that transforms societv and enhances the interest of men, will be the search for the individual. That individual may not always be discoverable, even as in the case of the English village; much difficulty would be encountered in the endeavor to ascertain the single individual whose aspiration and success became a beacon

In the meantime, here's some information on Homer Lodge No. 352's first Worshipful Master (1855-1857) and Charter Member Dr. Ashbel Patterson. We look forward to seeing everyone soon. **DEATH OF**

Dr. Ashbel Patterson

It has long been known that Dr. Patterson was in very feeble health and his death was looked for almost daily, therefore but few will be surprised-though many will be grieved – to learn that our esteemed townsman passed to his rest last evening. Ashbel Patterson was born in New Lebanon, Columbia County, on the 29th of March, 1803. At the age of 18 he entered Berkshire Medical College in Pittsfield, Mass., graduated with honor and in 1824 came to this county and settled in Danby. In the following year he married Miss Eliza Sackett Hill, daughter of the well-remembered "Uncle" Uri Hill. He left Danby in 1834, and located in Homer where he remained until 1858. While a resident of Cortland county he was prominently interested in public affairs and was once or twice sent to the Legislature by the democratic party, of which he was ever an active and uncompromising member. In 1858 he came to Ithaca and for almost a score of years was engaged in an extensive and exceedingly lucrative medical practice. Noted for his keen judgment, shrewd business qualifications as well as his kind heart he soon became popular. It is said that he never would refuse a call from even the poorest and most humble person requiring medical aid, nor would he join the combination which had for its object the increase of fees for professional services, saying that he thought the old rates were high enough and all that the poor could afford. The Doctor was never known to enter into any business enterprise which bore the slightest resemblance to speculation, he even declined to touch a bond of any description. His friends assert that the goodly fortune which he leaves was amassed by the successful practice of his profession extending over the period of fifty-five years. The deceased leaves three children, viz.: U.H. [Uri Hill] Patterson, of Binghamton, Dwight, of Syracuse, and Mrs. Uri Clark of this vil-

Within the Seventeenth Degree, we have what is called a "Tracing Board." In this design is a heptagon embracing a circle. At the points outside of the heptagon are the letters: B. D. W. P. H. G. F. and at the points inside the heptagon are the letters: F. U. R. D. F. P. T. Also, there are seven golden candlesticks over which are the letters: E. S. P. T. S. P. L. These letters represent the seven churches at Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamos, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia and Laodicea.

The letters outside the heptagon represent:

Beauty, to adorn our works

Divinity, to study which is one of our principal aims

Wisdom, to invent and work

Power, to punish and confront wicked brethren and the profane

Honor, as an indispensable quality of Freemasons Glory that the true Freemason is an equal to the sealed Book of Life and the God of Truth.

We discover in McClenachan's *The Book of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry*, that the surviving Knights and Princes of the Crusades returned to their respective countries resolved to do in theory (spend the last drop of their blood to establish a true religion) what they could not do in the Crusades.

"They took the names of Princes of Jerusalem and Knights of the East and West. In memory of the places where this Order was first instituted, and because their doctrines came from the East and West they have, ever since their first establishment, adhered to their customs and forms of reception. In the year 1118, the first Knights of the Order, to number of eleven, took their vows between the hands of Armelfo Guavi Mundos, who hailed from the province of Amiens in France and Prince Patriarch of Jerusalem."

YOU MUST BE PRESENT AT ONE OF THE SCHOLARSHIP PRE-SENTATION CEREMO-NIES TO BE ELIGIBLE TO CLAIM YOUR SCHOLAR-SHIP.

1. Scholarship grants are awarded to Royal Arch Masons, their wives (or significant other), children and grandchildren. The Royal Arch Mason(s) must be in good standing with the Grand Chapter, or was in good standing at the time of their demise should they be deceased.

2. Awards are based on Scholastic Achievement, Character, Financial need of the Applicant as expressed in an essay composed by the applicant and Recommendations if required. Decisions of the Scholarship Committee are final.

3. An Applicant can receive a Scholarship grant for teachers, coaches, etc. who have had supervision over and observation of the applicant's academic work during the past two years. b) The third may be someone who has known the applicant well over a period of time, preferably a Mason and should not be a relative or family member! c) Notification of College Acceptance. NOTE: If you have previously received a Royal Arch Scholarship no recommendations are needed.

8. Complete Official Transcripts of grades (bearing the High School or College Name) must be included in the application. Internet or grade reports are not acceptable.

6. The membership of the Royal Arch Sponsor including Chapter Name and Number along with the Sponsor's relationship to the Applicant is required. Scholarship need and worthiness of the applicant are documented in the essay.

7. If you have NOT RE-CEIVED A Royal Arch Scholarship in the past you must attach three (3) written recommendations with the application:

a) Two (2) of which should be from instructors,

transcript of grades, essay and if required, letters of recommendation and notification of college acceptance, MUST be submitted at the same time as the APPLICA-TION.

I urge all interested parties to visit the website and view the application requirements in their entirety. Advance planning may be necessary to obtain grade transcripts and the signature of the sponsoring Chapter Secretary.
