#### **About The Reading Course**

Since its inception, the Chancellor Robert R Livingston Masonic Library of Grand Lodge has served as an educational resource for Masons across New York State and visitors from around the world. The Library is the repository of information relating to the subject of Freemasonry broadly defined, with a focus on Freemasonry in New York State. Over the years, thousands of scholars, researchers, and inquiring people have made use of the print and artifact collections.

It is easy for patrons to be overwhelmed by the vast amount of material related to Freemasonry, making it difficult for patrons to find a good place to begin their studies of Freemasonry. Our Reading Course can address this problem.

The Reading Course program began in the 1930s, to expand access to Masonic education and introduce Masons to the Library collections. In the summer of 2007, the Library Board of Trustees and staff drew upon feedback and evaluations to revise the Reading Course program. The results of the revisions are described in the pages that follow, together with a series of questions and answers regarding how to participate in the Reading Course

# Who can take part in the Reading Course?

The Reading Course is open to all Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft, and Master Masons in good standing in a lodge under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of New York.

# How Many Reading Courses Are There?

The Reading Course program includes 17 courses divided into six (6) subgroups. The courses are numbered and structured to suggest a sequence and natural progression, but Brothers are free to begin and proceed as they choose.

#### How many books are in each Course?

Each Course averages five (5) books.

# Does each Course tell me everything I need to know about a topic?

No. However, the books in each Course provide a cross-section of information that serves as a foundation of knowledge about a topic area.

## How do I enroll in the Reading Course?

You may enroll in three ways

# What will happen after I enroll?

If readers receive books by mail, the first book will arrive once registered, and the signed **Borrowing Policy** is on file. Those who register on-site will leave with a book.

# How do I know when my book is due?

Books are loaned for a four (4) week period. The due date is written next to the title on the blue Reading Course card, included with each book. To renew a loaned book, contact the Librarian or Library Director.

#### Will the books arrive in any particular order?

The books listed on your Reading Course Card are in alphabetical order. They will arrive in that order unless a title is unavailable for lending. If you receive a book out of sequence, it means that all copies of the next book in the sequence are on loan and will be sent at the next availability. If you would like to receive a specific book, contact the library staff by e-mail or phone, and we will send that title when it is next available.

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#### Can I receive all the books at the same time?

Our policy currently limits patrons to one (1) book at a time. At times, the Librarian or Director will make exceptions. If you have any questions, please call or e-mail the Librarian or Library Director.

# What do I do when I finish a book?

When you have finished, place the book in a new padded envelope, affix the return mailing label inserted in the back pocket of the book, and send the book to the Library from the post office at the Library Mail shipping rate. You are welcome to return books using another mailing service. Once we receive your book, we will send the next book in the course to you by mail.

If you can visit the Library in person, you can return the book during business hours or drop it off in the book drop, located outside the Library.

# What happens when I finish the last book in the course?

Return the book with your Reading Course card (see instructions on the previous page), and include a brief note letting us know which course you would like to start next. We will not automatically enroll you in the next course.

Upon completing each course, you will receive a certificate of completion. The certificate will be formally presented to you by a District Staff Officer during an official visit or another appropriate occasion. Alternatively, certificates can be mailed directly to you. Readers who complete all 17 Courses will be presented with a lapel pin, recognizing their achievement.

## What if I disagree with a particular book or author?

Good! It demonstrates that you are being challenged. Challenging scholarship is an important component of the educational process. Some of the books were selected because they challenge preconceived notions. It is up to each patron to read, evaluate, and judge the contents of the books they choose to read.

#### Section 1 - Tile Ground Floor

The Ground Floor is the place for Brothers to begin.

<u>Course 1</u> is a survey course. These five (5) books are the foundation of Masonic education as they describe the history, philosophy, symbolism, and traditions of Freemasonry. The books also represent diverse authors, from Masonic traditionalists (e.g., Claudy and Roberts) to non-Masonic historians (e.g., Ridley). Subsequent courses will emphasize and concentrate on individual areas of Masonic study.

#### Section 4: The Sanctum Sanctorum

This section symbolically finds the Reading Course participants at the thematic end of a long journey to the East, ready to apply their knowledge to leadership roles. The theoretical and philosophical lessons of the first nine (9) courses will assist in the practical application of interpersonal, time-management, and other leadership skill sets.

<u>Course 10</u> focuses on knowledge important to the role of a Warden of the Lodge.

#### Section 2: The Middle Chamber, Part 1

Stepping further along on the Pathway to Masonic Light, Brothers enter the first part of the Middle Chamber, with a quartet of courses that expand on the topics from the Ground Floor.

Course 4 focuses on the rich and robust history of Freemasonry in New York State. The Course allows the reader to choose a Lodge history of a New York State Lodge to finish the Course. ## Section 3: The Middle Chamber, Part 2
